One of my favorite stories from scripture...and my favorite Sundays...is the Pentecost story. Where Jews from all over the known world at that time, were gathered together in Jerusalem to celebrate “The Feast of Weeks”, which is an annual harvest celebration in the Jewish tradition held 50 days after Passover. It was during this particular festival, 10 days after Jesus’ ascension that the Holy Spirit moved through those first disciples, empowering them to do things no one thought possible. About 3000 people came to faith that day. Not bad for the “kick-off” of a new church movement!

You know...thinking about it, they could have easily been content and just enjoyed their new beginnings and their new community of faith. Getting to know each other. Having potluck dinners together, bible study and just made it about them. But they didn’t. They continued to do many wonders and signs as we are told. They met in the temple courts, sharing the good news and the love of God. And as we read...“they enjoyed the favor of the people and the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.”

Kure Memorial Lutheran Church isn’t much different. We have a great history...one that not many of us are aware of. Maybe you’ve seen some old photos posted in the fellowship hall of the church’s early beginnings. But there is so much to the story. And as much as we want to share that story of our history...we, as the church continue to grow and impact the growing community around us!

And the important thing for us to remember...is that our desire and need to grow is twofold. That desire and need comes first from our calling from God to be the church in our world today, sharing his love and grace with the world around us and reaching out to those in need. But I also believe that our desire and need to grow comes from our amazing history! When KMLC began with Sunday school classes in 1942-1943, and was then reorganized as “Kure Memorial Chapel” in 1946, it was because those who began the church never meant for it to be stagnant or to be content the way it was! They felt the calling God had for them...and they continued to grow.

We’ve come a long way since those early days...and we, through the inspiration of our history as well as God’s calling for what he has in store for us...continue to cast our vision for our future!

Church Women United: Will continue to put things on hold until further notice.





In 1898, the city of Wilmington, North Carolina, was unusual in the South for having a government that included African Americans in many positions of authority. *Wilmington's Lie* shows how that was all violently changed – not through a riot but through a well-planned murderous coup.

“This brutal insurrection is a rare instance of a violent overthrow of an elected government in the U.S. It halted gains made by blacks and restored racism as official government policy, cementing white rule for another half century. It was not a “race riot,” as the events of November 1898 came to be known, but rather a racially motivated rebellion launched by white supremacists.

In *Wilmington's Lie*, Pulitzer Prize-winner David Zucchino uses contemporary newspaper accounts, diaries, letters, and official communications to create a gripping and compelling narrative that weaves together individual stories of hate and fear and brutality. From the Financial Secretary:

September has been an interesting month contributions-wise. The number of folks who contributed weekly varied from two weeks with a low of 11, to this past Sunday where 30 families contributed. For the month of September, 49 different families contributed. We had four people using the on-line giving option and a few families used the Bank BillPay option for the first time.

Our Mission Plan projected that we would need \$ 17,474 this month - based on 4 weeks x (\$4,368.50.) Our actual tithes and offerings were \$15,306 - about \$2,168 below "need". While we did not match the original Mission plan projections, there were some positive signs. We had what could be called "Make-up contributions". At least ten families who have given sparingly since March, made larger contributions this month. Then this Sunday, folks rejoiced with re-opening worship and our contributions were generous.

Looking ahead, we hope to send out third quarter contribution statements in the next couple of weeks. This is a tool that will help you assess your contributions for the year-to-date. We encourage you to continue to support our many ministries. We are thankful for so many generous families who continue to contribute during these trying days and we want you to know that we are grateful for the many ways you open your hearts and share your resources and talents.

Medicare Open Enrollment: October 15 - December 7, 2020

All Medicare beneficiaries are encouraged to examine their prescription drug coverage each year, as policies and prices change. In addition, the medication needs of an individual can change from year to year. This year some plans will be offering a **Senior's Savings Model** where a thirty-day supply of insulin vials and pen injections will cost a maximum of \$35. You may want to see if your current plan offers this model. You may find that changing Prescription Drug plans saves you money.

During Open Enrollment, the New Hanover County Senior Resource Center will have SHIIP volunteers available to provide one-on-one counseling by phone only. Due to the pandemic and limited availability, please call the appointment line at 910-798-6442. They will give you any further information that you may need.

There are two items of interest that have recently been made public by the North Carolina Department of revenue.

1. **Coronavirus Relief Act 3.0** On September 4th, Governor Cooper signed into law the Coronavirus Relief Act 3.0. This law is designed to help North Carolina families by providing economic support to assist with virtual schooling and child care costs incurred during the Covid-19 pandemic. The law gives \$335 for each qualifying child. If you already filed 2019 North Carolina State income tax, you do not have to do anything. A check will automatically be sent to you.

However, if you did not need to file North Carolina income tax, you are still be able to apply for the grant of \$335 per qualifying child. There are two qualification: the parent who is applying **MUST** have been a resident of North Carolina for the **entire** 2019 year. Qualified children are defined as children who lived with you six months or more, whom you fully supported and they were **younger than 17 on December 31, 2019.**

To apply for this grant, you will need an application - Form NC 1105 (covers one child) and Form NC 1105-1 where you can list up to seven additional qualifying children.

To get the application, go to: www.ncdor.gov/extracredit#application-for-grant-award

All grant applications must be postmarked by October 15, 2020.

2. **Change in North Carolina State Income Tax Returns for those using itemized deductions:**

What follows here applies only to those who itemize deductions and had medical expenses included. There is no change for those who used the Standard Deduction.

Toward the end of the 2019 tax season, the North Carolina State legislature enacted a law that modified the amounts of itemized deductions to bring them into conformity with Federal Regulations. At the time when most people filed their income tax, the IRS used 7.5% of the adjusted gross income as a deductible for Medical expenses. North Carolina was using a larger deductible - tax payers needed to deduct 10% of their adjusted gross income before they could claim medical expenses. Under the new law - which is retroactive to include 2019 and 2020, you need to use the 7.5% deduction. This means you may be able to get some money back. You are eligible to file an amended 2019 return to get back the difference.

Go to www.NCdor.gov to get the necessary forms. When you complete the amended itemized medical deduction, you may need to change the printed word from 10% to 7.5%. As always, you can contact Terry Hambel for assistance and/or answers to questions. (tmurtha2@aol.com; 910-769-1761)

President's Letter May 2019

Kure Memorial Lutheran Church Part I



117 North 3rd Street in Kure Beach is the address of Kure Memorial Lutheran Church. It is a block off of busy Fort Fisher Boulevard and a block from K Avenue. The brick church building opened its doors for a dedication service on June 26, 1955, but the congregation had its beginnings before that.

Kure Lutheran's story actually begins during the war years of 1942-43 and not as a church but with nondenominational Sunday School classes at the home of Mrs. W. O. Fickling located near the intersection of S. Fort Fisher Boulevard and K Avenue. The adults who came were taught by retired Lutheran minister Rev. B. D. Wessinger. As the town filled with soldiers and their families, defense and shipyard workers and those with other war related jobs, the Sunday School outgrew Mrs. Fickling's home. The Sunday School began meeting in a vacant store building owned by Lawrence C. Kure.

Founders of Kure Beach, Mr. and Mrs. Hans Kure, Sr. had set aside land on 3rd Street for the time when a Lutheran church could be organized. Hans and Ellen Kure deeded the land to St. Matthews Lutheran Church in Wilmington for safe keeping until the time arose. In 1946 the Sunday School group reorganized as Kure Memorial Chapel with a constitution and soon after St. Matthews deeded the 3rd Street property to them as a nondenominational church. Pastor Wessinger, Mrs. Fickling and Lawrence Kure began fund raising for a building with fish suppers and the like. Soon they were able to purchase two Army barracks from Fort Fisher. They put them together in the shape of a T and added a vestibule on the front replete with a steeple. The converted barracks were dedicated as Kure Memorial Chapel on December 1, 1946. Pastor Wessinger officiated assisted by Rev. Edwin Carter from Carolina Beach Methodist Church and retired Salvation Army Major John O'Beinne.

The first trustees of Kure Memorial Chapel were Fred Schenk, Linwood Flowers and Lewis E. Weinberg. The first wedding in the Chapel was on July 13, 1949 as Oscar B. Wrenn and Anna Lee Lewis were married by Rev. Edwin Carter and Dexter Moser. A. E. "Punky" Kure and Jean A. Kure were married there in 1952.

Sunday School was held every Sunday with a church service once a month held by Pastor Wessinger until ill health forced him to resign. In the summer of 1949 Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary student Dexter Moser conducted services every Sunday. In winter other students from the seminary, located in Columbia, South Carolina, held monthly services. In the summers of 1950 and 1951 seminarian Jack Martin conducted Sunday services.

3 WAYS TO VOTE IN NORTH CAROLINA



NC voters will not only choose a President. Select a US Senator, Governor, NC Supreme Court judges, legislators and others.

The winners will make decisions affecting every part of your life, but you help decide who wins! Read the candidates' views in this Guide, then make your choices.

1. MAIL-IN VOTING: do it early!

Any registered voter may vote from the safety of home; no special reason is needed. See demnc.co/absentee for more details. Do this as early as you can.

REQUEST BALLOT: Use the form on page 26 or fill out a form entirely online at demnc.co/portal. Deadline for your county to receive a request is Oct. 27, but it's best to send it by Oct. 15. Need help? Call 888-OUR-VOTE.

VOTE BALLOT: The ballot comes with a return envelope and instructions; follow them carefully. Mark the ballot with a witness nearby. You and the witness must sign a certificate on the return envelope. The witness can be a spouse or anyone over 18, but not a candidate.

RETURN BALLOT. Mail the envelope with one stamp to the board of elections. You (or your near relative or guardian) may hand deliver it to the board or an Early Voting location. Don't wait for the Nov. 3 deadline. To be safe, return the envelope by Oct. 24.

NO PHOTO ID NEEDED TO VOTE

2. EARLY VOTING: Oct. 15-Oct. 31

Use Early Voting and avoid possible bad weather on Election Day. Definitely use Early Voting if you have moved or need to update your voter registration (see box, page 5). Many sites open on weekends. Find locations for Early Voting in your county at NCVoter.org or call 866-522-4723 or 888-687-8683. Masks, sanitizers and social distancing at the polls make voting safe.

3. ELECTION DAY: Tuesday, Nov. 3

On Election Day, go to your own precinct's polling place. Polls are open from 6:30 am to 7:30 pm. If you are in line by 7:30 pm, you can vote. If you go to the wrong poll in your county and don't have time to get to the right place, ask for a *provisional ballot*. To find your precinct's poll and see who is on your ballot, go to demnc.co/lookup. Call the Hotline below for help.
