The Season of Lent is in full swing and will be coming to a close at the end of the month as we will arrive at Palm Sunday and then move into Holy Week. As Covid restrictions are easing, we will be finalizing what all of those services will look like. The good news is...that we will be able to worship together in person this year in addition to livestreaming, which, livestreaming is all we could do last year! That’s the good news...the best news...is that the tomb is empty and Jesus has risen!!! Because with this news...we can figure out the rest!

Here is a peak into what that week *may* have in store for us! A lot will depend on the weather as to where we will worship, but this

is an idea of what it might look like!

Palm/Passion Sunday (March 28): The plan will be to worship outdoors around the gazebo, with livestreaming through Zoom and Facebook Live. We will all receive palm branches as we arrive for worship. We will not be processing this year, as we remember the Jesus’ Triumphant Entry into Jerusalem, however we will begin our worship in celebration of, “the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!” We will then transition into the sadness of his death as we experience his journey to the cross through the streets of Jerusalem with the singing of Via Dolorosa!

We will then continue our journey through Holy Week: We plan to gather outdoors for worship on Maundy Thursday (April 1), Good Friday (April 2) and will have our Easter Vigil service on Saturday (April 3), all of which we are planning to be outdoors, beginning at 7pm. The Easter Vigil, which is a service that commemorates Jesus passing from death to life, begins around a fire, we traditionally light the Pascal candle symbolizing the presence of the Resurrected Christ in our midst. Although with worship outdoors this year, we aren’t sure what this will look like! All of these services are planned to be held around the gazebo as well as livestreamed on Zoom and Facebook Live.

Easter morning (April 4) begins with our Easter Sunrise Service. Again, at this point we are not sure where this will be or how it will happen! We will gather in person and it will be livestreamed as well. It will begin at 6:45am as Sunrise is scheduled for 6:54am.

Join us for our Easter worship celebration here at Kure Memorial which will begin at 10am, outside around the gazebo. We hope you will join us and participate in all of our services, either in person or via livestream, as we journey through this most Holy time of year!

Costa Rica Shoe Challenge! As the traveling Costa Rica Mission Team prepares to travel to Costa Rica again, at this point, in the summer of 2022, we are issuing a challenge for our KMLC family! Now, here is the challenge: We are challenging you to help us raise money for our trip and at the same time invest in small business owners in developing nations! All without giving any money! We are challenging you to help us collect gently worn or new shoes! That’s it! Clean out your closets! Ask your friends and neighbors to clean out their closets! And give us the shoes you will be giving away anyway! For each pair of shoes donated, we as a mission team benefit by earning money. What happens to

the shoes you may wonder? The shoes are given to small business owners in developing countries, who sell the shoes at reasonable prices in their communities...so the business owner benefits from the shoes as well as their customer who was able to buy them! So...just by donating your shoes...you are actually helping 4 different groups of people! Yourself (you clean out your closet), our traveling mission team (we raise money), the small business owner (who sells the shoes) and the customer (who purchases them)! The challenge began in February and will conclude in April! Our goal is to collect 2500 pairs of shoes! Yes, it sounds like a lot! But with your help, we are sure to reach our goal! We started with this project last year...so we already have a head start! We are working with an organization called, “Funds2Orgs”. Be sure to check out their website: www.funds2orgs.com. One of the great things about this, is that it helps small business owners in developing nations, much like the micro loan project Kure Memorial started in Costa Rica 5 years ago! So...let this challenge continue to build momentum! Continue collecting your shoes! There is a plastic bin in the church entryway if you bring them to the church, or let us know and we can come and pick them up for you! Thanks for your support!

Please bring your lawn chairs, mask and a cup of coffee, and come out and join us at 8:30am for "Coffee and Conversation"! We will meet alongside the church in the lawn area near the gazebo...on these chilly days, there is more sunshine to warm our souls...and our bones! Of course, by the end of March, we should be in good shape. For those who have come, it has been great to see everyone and get a chance to visit. Hope to see you here!

Pastors during those years were:


Rev. John B. Barringer 1970-1973

Rev. Everette E. Horne 1974-1975


Rev. Jacob H. Young 1975-1990

Johnson to deliver the sermon since he was the first full time pastor. Also invited was Dr. F. L. Conrad, who was still president of the Synod and also conducted the first service in 1955 building. 





From the KMLC Racial Equality/Justice Dialog Team:

“So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God, he created them; male and female he created them.” (Genesis 1:27) Last month we invited you to reflect on our Statement of Welcome, with regard to how they relate to who we are as a community of faith and how we welcome and care for all people...of all races, cultures and backgrounds. This month we want to share excerpts from an article entitled, *“A Theology of Racial Healing”* that was published on the website, “The Emmanuel Gospel Center” (egc.org). (Go to: <https://www.egc.org/blog-2/2019/9/27/a-theology-of-racial-healing> to view the entire article!)

What does the Bible say about race? While the word “race” is used in the biblical text, it does not refer to the concepts of race and racism we think of today. That is because these realities are relatively new social developments. Although people have had different skin colors throughout history, it was not until the 16th century that skin color was given social meaning and used to create a hierarchy that elevated white people and devalued people of color. With that having been said, the dynamics of cultural difference, prejudice, division and power differentials that characterize our society today were present across ethnic lines in the Bible.

How Scripture addresses ethnic divisions can offer insight for how to navigate racism:

What did ethnic tensions look like in the Bible? Here’s some background: The Jews and Gentiles were different ethno-cultural and religious groups. They lived distinctly different lives, seen in their divergent values, practices, social networks, and religious customs. Socio-political tensions arose between the two groups because there was a history of the Jews being oppressed by the Gentiles. Because the Jews were set apart in the Old Testament to be the people through which God chose to reveal Himself to humanity, Jews felt a sense of superiority over the Gentiles as well. BUT...The good news is: *Despite these obstacles, God united these two groups in him. The relationship between Jews and Gentiles can serve as a model for our understanding of God’s desire to bring together people across racial lines.*

So...with that background...How are we to understand racism from a Biblical perspective?

As we began this article with the passage from Genesis 1:27...the reminder that God created all people in his image giving each individual equal and inherent worth. Upon creation, people were in right relationship with God and one another. This reflected God’s intention for the world, and his triune nature, existing in unity and diversity. That didn’t last long...because when sin entered the world, these relationships were broken, and God has been working to restore them ever since.

What is the impact of Racism from the perspective of our Christian witness?

Racism...

Dishonors the image of God in people when we consider them to be less human or less valuable on account of the skin color God gave them.

Hinders the effectiveness of the body of Christ when we have diminished capacity to collaborate across racial lines.

Diminishes the Christian witness when the Church reflects the brokenness seen in society at large instead of reflecting the healing power of Jesus.

So...There are similarities between racial tensions in Jesus’ day and our own day:

Racial differences today cause similar divisions to those between ethnic lines seen in Ancient Near Eastern Society in the time of Jesus. *But...*Christ’s redemptive work calls us to love both God and our neighbors (Matthew 22:36-40, 1 John 4:20). Today, addressing racism and its impact is a crucial part of continuing Christ’s reconciling work between people (2 Corinthians 5:18).

Matthew 22:36-40: “Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?” He said to him, “You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.’ This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: ‘You shall love your neighbor as yourself.’ On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.”

1 John 4:20: Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen.
2 Corinthians 5:18: All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation;

Questions to ponder: *Look at and ponder these bible verses. Which speaks loudest to you? Which would be easier or more difficult to live out? Ponder the 3 bullet points above. What do you think God was thinking when he made us all with different shades of skin? Have you seen collaboration done well? What made it successful? Can we apply those same strategies to racial collaboration?*
